Wet Feathers! A Nebraska River Roundup

ebraska rivers provide habitat for many of our state's birds. The September general meeting program will highlight the challenges and possible solutions facing Nebraska's Platte, Missouri, and Niobrara rivers.

The Platte River provides critical habitat for migrating whooping cranes and sandhill cranes. Cranes roost at night on the sandbars in the Platte's wide,

braided sandy channel. Interior least terns and piping plovers build nests on those same sandbars in the summer. Flows in the Central Platte have dropped to about one-third of their historic volume, shrinking the habitat available.

The Platte River Recovery Program is a basin-wide, long-term effort to protect river flows and provide habitat for terns, plovers, and whooping cranes. The Program's governance

committee is considering whether to extend the program for another 10-13 years, and the decision will have an impact on cranes and other migrating birds for generations to come.

The Missouri River hosts ducks, geese, and other waterfowl on their migratory journey. Plovers and terns use the sandbars in the river for summer nesting. Bald eagles from Canada spend the winter along its open waters.

Before a century-long effort to straighten and strangle the river, the Missouri looked much like the Platte, with wide, braided sandy channels that shifted across the floodplain. Today, the river's flows are rigidly controlled by the Army Corps of Engineers, which manages huge dams upstream. The Corps is considering options to address the needs of the rare birds that depend on the Missouri, but none of the alternatives may be strong enough to protect our feathered friends.

Niobrara River sandbars also provide habitat for whooping cranes, terns, and plovers. The Fort Niobrara National Wildlife Refuge is known for its bison and elk herds, but it was originally established as a preserve and breeding ground for native birds.

Summer flows in the Niobrara have dropped as a result of irrigation upstream. An innovative plan to buy a small dam with a big old water right presents an opportunity to protect flows for future generations of people and wildlife, but will it work?

Duane Hovorka was born and raised in Lincoln and earned a BA in political science from UNL. He joined the Nebraska Wildlife Federation in 1992 and served as president from 1994 to 1997. Duane spent 10 years helping to negotiate the Platte River Recovery Program. He has received numerous accolades in his career including Wachiska Audubon's 2012 Earthkeeper Award.

Labor Day Labor of Love

Identifying shorebirds during fall migration has its challenges but also its rewards. Immature and nondescript plumages can be difficult to sort out, and often their distant proximity doesn't help this tough work. A shorebird outing to Conestoga Lake State Recreation Area will give birders an opportunity to join forces while we scrutinize the peeps foraging along the mudflats. It's possible there may also be some larger shorebirds present like yellowlegs or godwits. The lake is currently being kept at a low water level for renovation which creates an attractive rest stop for migrants.

We'll meet at **10:30 a.m.** on **Monday, September 5** (Labor Day), in the Wachiska office parking lot in Lincoln at 4547 Calvert Street. Suggested items to bring include water bottle, insect repellent, and binoculars and scope if you have them. Conestoga Lake SRA is located about five miles west of Lincoln, and we should arrive on the north side of the lake by the boat ramp shortly before 11:00 a.m. for anyone preferring to meet up with the group there. A vehicle entry permit is required, and a day pass is available for \$5. The public is welcome. If you have questions, call John at 402-475-7275.

Fall Birdseed Sale to Include Garage Sale

We'll need donations of saleable household items (no clothing, please) such as small furniture, dishes, linens, toys, children's and baby items, lamps, jewelry, silverware, camping and sports equipment, any of the usual "good stuff" you find at garage sales. In addition, homemade cake, pie, rolls, cupcakes, jellies, etc. are always the first to be sold. Please <u>help by pricing all</u> <u>items before you bring them.</u> We can alter prices, if needed, but won't have the manpower or time to price everything. Thank you for your support of these two concurrent activities. They are a lot of work, but donations in several ways is what fuels our volunteer organization.

Remember Wachiska's Prairie Management Fund As You Plan Your Year-End or Estate Charitable Giving

As of August 15, Wachiska Audubon Society's Prairie Management Fundraising Campaign passed the \$120,000 mark on our march toward our goal of raising \$1 million. Our goal is to create an investment fund which would initially pay for a parttime person to help with prairie preservation activities under the supervision of the conservation committee. With over 1,000 acres under Wachiska's protection or ownership, management of this land is a big job. When we reach \$1 million, we will create an endowment to generate funds to meet our many prairie protection responsibilities.

2016 is the first year of our three-year fundraising push. This year we are focused on getting gifts and pledges from our members. Next year we will begin applying for grants. It is important that we can demonstrate strong member support when we apply for grants.

What is quite interesting is the diverse ways people are choosing to give:

- Paul Johnsgard, and Tom Dickerson and Patty Shanahan gave generous cash gifts this spring.
- Nancy Hinnah donated an appreciated IRA account (with transfer assistance from the Lincoln Community Foundation).
- Stephen Cooley and Lorraine Cooley, children of former Wachiska member Jimmie Cooley, each donated \$5,000 in memory of their mother who passed away in 2015.
- During the Give to Lincoln Day event, Peg and Larry Fletcher donated \$5,000 and Tim Knott donated \$2,000, both directed toward the Prairie Management Fund.
- Scott Johns and Elizabeth Nelson each signed up to make a regular monthly donation using credit cards through the Lincoln Community Foundation's online giving portal.
- Marilyn McNabb has made Wachiska the beneficiary of a mutual fund, so its value will come to Wachiska if not used in her lifetime.

FEED MIXES

Regal Audubon Mix – sunflower hearts, peanuts, safflower seed, raisins, protein pellets

Standard Audubon Mix – white millet, sunflower seed, cracked corn, peanuts, oat groats

Classic Audubon Mix – sunflower seed and hearts, white millet, cracked corn, safflower seed, peanuts, oat groats

Attraction Audubon Mix -sunflower seed and hearts, safflower seed, peanuts, raisins, protein pellets

Woodpecker Gourmet – 75% nuts (almonds, peanuts, walnuts), pumpkin seed, corn, black oil sunflower seed and hearts, safflower seed

Bushy Tail Treat – peanuts, sunflower seed, whole corn, raisins, pumpkin seed, feed pellets. Treat your favorite backyard squirrels and keep them away from the bird feeders!

SUET CAKES

High Energy Treat – sunflower seeds, millet, cracked corn; enjoyed by most wild birds

NEW! Berry Treat - a wonderful winter treat

SEEDS

White Millet (98%) – popular with cardinals, mourning doves, house finches, juncos, sparrows

Nyjer Thistle (NEW smaller 8lb. bag) – all-time favorite of finches, chickadees, juncos

Peanuts (shelled) – attractive for woodpeckers and blue jays

Peanuts in the shell – watch your bushy tail friends crack the shells to get their favorite treat

Safflower Seed – good for house finches, chickadees, cardinals, wood peckers – NOT FAVORED by squirrels and grackles

Sunflower Hearts – highly prized by birds and leave less mess—use coarse hearts for feeders with large openings that might allow fine hearts to drop out

Black Oil Sunflower Seed – favored by most seedeating birds; high oil content for more energy




