





2) ADVOCATING FOR THE ENVIRONMENT

- CONTINUED COMMUNICATION AND COORDINATION WITH AUDUBON GREAT PLAINS, AUDUBON KANSAS, AND AUDUBON SOCIETY OF OMAHA TO STAY INFORMED AND WORK ON SIMILAR ISSUES.
- EDUCATION/OUTREACH EFFORTS INCLUDED BIRD ENCOUNTER, EARTH DAY, RETURN OF THE THUNDERBIRDS, NATURE NIGHTS, PRAIRIE DISCOVERY, TOUR THE WILD SIDE, ARBOR DAY, SPRING CREEK PRAIRIE'S HOOT 'N OWL, BRINGING RAPTORS TO AFTER SCHOOL PROGRAMS – CONNECTED WITH OVER 2,000 INDIVIDUALS, MOST OF WHOM ARE ELEMENTARY STUDENTS.

3) CARING FOR TALLGRASS PRAIRIES

- CONTINUE CONSULTATION AND COOPERATION WITH NORTHERN PRAIRIES LAND TRUST TO MANAGE THE PRAIRIES WACHISKA OWNS
 - CROPLAND ON WILDCAT PRAIRIE WAS RESEEDED TO NATIVE PLANT HABITAT
 - PERIMETER FENCELINE REPLACEMENT CONTINUES ON KLAPKA PRAIRIE
 - NEW WATER TANKS BEING INSTALLED ON KLAPKA PRAIRIE TO ENABLE SEASONAL GRAZING
